## President's Message

I recently joined a few fellow club members at an informational program on the status of the wild steel-head restoration program. It was led by two key State Fish and Game Department biologists on their own personal time and under trying circumstances. The program contained a lot of interesting information. While I'm not going to get into the details here (give me a call if you're interested) I did come away with three conclusions that should be of interest to anyone who enjoys fishing and who hopes to fish in the future.

- 1. The picture for California steelhead is grim and all of us should care. Due to the disastrous drop in fish population, it is now necessary to implement more stringent fishing regulations and, most likely, to close some waters to steelhead fishing. This should be a concern to all of us who fish, since many of the problems affecting steelhead, including habitat loss and degradation, affect other species of fish as well.
- 2. The State Fish and Game biologists are our hardworking friends. While we don't always agree with them, they are trying, with very limited resources, to be the sole voice of science in a world where too few people give a damn about what happens to our streams and our fish. We need to work closely with them.
- 3. The future of our fisheries depends on politics. In this meeting, the evidence of politics impacting our fisheries was plentiful. Further, during the past year many of us have run head on into the forces of politics in other areas while trying to make sure the right things

were done to protect our streams and our fish. For example, it took a storm of letters and the serious threat of a lawsuit by an alliance of conservation groups to head off potential wide scale suction dredging in trout streams - and the threat has not passed. Also, amazing as it may seem, legislation is actually in the works to liberalize restrictions on cattle grazing on public lands and lower the fees livestock operators pay for the privilege. In the interest of space and to avoid offending anyone, I'll stop with these examples.

So what does all this mean? It means it's time for those of us who care about streams and fish to do our part to influence the political process and to invest in our fishing future. Letter writing is an important part of this. It is essential, however, that we also speak with our wallets. Join one of the fine organizations that are working hard to make sure our interests are heard. Here are three suggestions with their phone numbers and web site URL addresses.

# Pattern for March Program: "Bead Rockworm"

(Featured in February Leader)

**Program rules:** Don't be reluctant to submit a fly. Ask for a critique if you want help.

- Judging will be during the meeting
- Best tied fly announced just before program, and name of tier featured in the next month's Leader
- Fly must be tied in accordance with instructions from the Leader (right or wrong, and irrespective of whether you find another version of the pattern in a book somewhere), in order to keep the playing field level. The judges need to make a choice based on a single pattern.
- Two categories: beginner and non-beginner; anyone who has won the beginner category twice will have



to compete in the non-beginner category from then on.

This is an educational program for those who wish to advance their tying skills, and/or just enjoy this aspect of the sport.

#### Gerle Creek Reservoir Fishout Saturday, June 6, 1998 Mike Wasserman

The Gerle Creek Reservoir is about 35 miles from Highway 50 on Ice House Road. The entrance to the reservoir is about three to four miles past the Loon Lake turnoff.

A fairly small lake, Gerle Creek Reservoir is excellent for float tubes. You can also fish from shore. There is good access all around the lake. Prams or canoes would be OK (no gas motors allowed).

Fishing is primarily for browns, with a few rainbows also available. I recommend a floating line and some sort of sinking line (sink tip or full sink). Standard trout flies are fine (wooly buggers, streamers, Sheep Creek, mosquito, elk hair caddis, etc.).

#### INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Cover hook shank with thread; apply 6 winds of weight at thorax area. Do now crowd head area, as room will be needed to tie off wing case and form nice head. Secure weight with thread wraps.
- 2. Just above back of barb (smash it), apply a small ball of dubbing. Tie one goose biot onto each side of hook in front of ball. By winding thread back against ball, biots will splay out easily. Tail should be no longer than 1/4 to 3/8" long, depending on hook size.
- 3. Tie rib wire on in front of tail.
- 4. Dub a sparse abdomen—meaning not too thick. Abdomen should cover rear 2/3 of hook.
- 5. Wind ribbing material forward and tie off at forward end of abdomen.
- 6. Remove about 1/2" of pheasant tail fibers from stem of feather. Take these and tie them in by their butts, with the butts facing forward and tips to rear. They should be tied in just where the abdomen ends. (Hint: to avoid a "gap" between abdomen and wingcase, wind back over butts and onto abdomen slightly).
- 7. Dub thorax area without crowding head area. Thorax should be thicker than abdomen.
- 8. Pull pheasant tail over thorax and tie off about 1/8" behind the eye. Do not cut off butts yet.
- 9. Isolate 3 of the butt fibers on the far side of hook, and pull them to the rear; do the same on close side of hook. Now trim off remainder of butts, and form head while at same time tying back the 6 fibers which you left uncut. These will form the legs. Trim them to a length which is just short of the point of the hook.

This fly needs to be right on the bottom, and fished with an indicator. Takes will be subtle, so keep a sharp, focused eye—and, see ya on the creek!!!!

#### Flytier's Corner

This Month's Pattern: "Bill's Simple Stone"

Here is another in our series of simple patterns. This pattern is very generic—which is its attraction for me. It can be tied in any color or size, and imitates virtually any species of stonefly nymph. The materials are common and inexpensive. And, by the way, it seems to appeal



to the quarry—judging by the "field tests". I have selected plain ole' black, but use your ingenuity.

#### MATERIALS

**Hook** Tiemco 200R or equivalent;

**Rib** Copper wire



#### Need A Tune-up?

Are you ready for the trout opener? GBF is offering several clinics for novices and the more experienced. Sign up at the next meeting for one or more of the following sessions.

Fly Casting Fundamentals: Saturday, March 14 at 10 a.m.; Saturday, March 21 at 10 a.m.; Sunday, March 29 at 1 p.m. — All three sessions will be at Bill Carnazzo's pond in Newcastle. (See directions below.) Bring your own lunch to Saturday sessions.

Session 1: Fundamental knots to assemble a casting system, line handling techniques, rod grip, stance, and basic theory of casting. Then progress to roll cast, the pickup-laydown forward cast with emphasis on loading and unloading the rod. By end of session, student should be able to roll cast 40 feet and do a pick-up and lay-down cast of 35 feet with a proper loop.

Session 2: False casting, timing for different length casts, proper fore- and back-cast loops, and changes of direction. Also special techniques for casting weighted nymphs, and shooting line for additional distance. Demonstrations of specialty casts such as the slack line cast, pile casts, curve casts and Belgian cast.

**Session 3:** Focus on technique and fault corrections, such as weak backcast, tailing loop, line hitting rod, inaccurate casts, and poor loop formation. The double haul will be introduced.

**Equipment needed:** Eyewear for protection from lines and rods, hat, sun screen.

Weather: If it storms, the clinic will be canceled for the day, but we will proceed if it is only light rain or mist.

**Signups:** Clinic limited to 12 students, must be over the age of 16, and members only. Total fee for all three sessions is \$15 payable to GBF.

Carnazzo's Pond: Take Hwy 80 to Newcastle exit. Follow signs to Lincoln (Hwy 193) through Newcastle. Go approx. 3 miles to Gold Hill Road, 2 miles to Schindler, one mile to Country Hill Run, turn right. Bill's place is first house on the right.


