The book titled "Fly-Tying" by Helen Shaw is as simplified and down to earth as her approach to presentation of fly tying, and her husband's photographic skills help depict the excellent instructional details throughout the book.

She leads you through selection and usage of tools, thread, tinsel and floss, various types of dubbing materials, hair, feathers and quill, then she takes you step by step through a pictorial session of each material clarifying the construction of a fly.

When you are through reading this book cover to cover, you will have a better understanding of the art of fly tying and no matter what stage of tying proficiency you are at, you will be a better tyer when you finish it. # GOLDEN TROUT PROGRAM BOOK REPORT

Book Read: <u>Caddisflies</u> by Gary LaFontaine

This book is a comprehensive work on the Caddisfly. It is structured into two parts. Part one is tying and fishing Caddisfly imitations and part two is biology of Caddisflies.


Part one starts with the area of concentration—in other words, where you should be fishing your artificial. Next is creating the effective pattern. Chapter two is the main focus of the book in which LaFontaine develops his deep sparkling pupa and emergent sparkling pupa. Each pattern was developed via in—stream observation of the Caddis pupae. From in field study the author uses a nylon filament known as Antron made by Dupont. The Antron captures the transluscent and reflected light of the pupa which LaFontaine observed in many hours of scuba diving. A whole series of pupa patterns were developed to match many different emerging Caddis.

The other chapters dealt with fishing technique, recognizing a Caddis hatch, and matching the proper pattern to the water type.

Part two of the book is the biology of the Caddisflies. Scientifically it deals with the classification of the Caddisfly. The habitat and distribution is also covered by family so one can fish patterns to the proper water type. The book ends with the author listing each genus with its hatch period and general imitation.

The reading of <u>Caddisflies</u> is a must for the flyfisher wanting to expand his knowledge of the Caddisfly.

# ROYAL WULFF



Lee Wulff, the famous fly tyer, fisherman, and film maker revolutionized fly fishing and fly tying with his Wulff series. These flies were one of the first ever invented using hair instead of natural feathers for wings and tails. These patterns catch trout, salmon, and steelhead, and are now used the world over. Probably no one series of flies has ever gained more popularity and become so widely accepted as the Wulff patterns. They are some of the most dependable fish-catchers ever tried.

I once asked Lee what his Royal Wulff represented. He puzzled a moment and replied with a smile, "Well, I don't think they represent any one natural insect, but more a dessert, something after the main course, a little like Strawberry shortcake. That's it, that's the best way I can describe my Royal Wulff, it looks like strawberry shortcake — something great big and juicy floating down to a large trout!"

In the mountain West the Royal Wulff represents the flying red ant hatches that appear during the months of August and September. Fished on small springs in sizes 14 and 16 it is deadly. Also on larger rivers during the last two weeks of August this fly in sizes 8, 10, and 12, is one of the best for Wyoming trout's dessert!

MATERIALS: Royal Wulff

**HOOK:** Mustad 94840, 7957B, or 3906.

**SIZES:** 6 to 20

**BODY:** Three of four wraps of peacock herl followed by red floss then by three

or four more wraps of peacock herl.

WING: Divided white calffail tied upright.

**HACKLE:** Brown saddle hackle (or still neck hackle on small sizes).

**HEAD:** Black monocord.

**TAIL:** Dark elk hair, or moose hair (fairly thick).
