





FLYTYER'S CORNER

ANDY BURKE'S FLAT TAIL **BASSWORM**

February, 1994

[NOTE: THIS PATTERN WILL NOT BE USED FOR THE FOR THE FLY TYING CONTEST. INSTEAD, SINCE WE WILL NOT BE HAVING A GENERAL MEETING FOR FEBRUARY (DUE TO THE ANNUAL DINNER), WE WILL USE THE WOOLY BUGGER, WHICH IS IN THE JANUARY BULLETIN, FOR THE MARCH CONTEST-WHICH MEANS BRING YOUR BEST WOOLY BUGGER TO THE GENERAL MEETING FOR THE CONTEST]

As we look forward to Spring, visions of largemouth bass and panfish putting a nice bend in that #4 rod come to mind. I personally have not tried this pattern, which appeared in the California Flyfisher last year. However, I do know Andy Burke, who is an excellent tyer and fisherman. Consequently, I have no hesitation recommending this pattern, which will soon get initiated on my own ponds, as well as others in the vicinity.

MATERIALS.

Tiemco 8089 (Stinger hook) Hook To match body Thread 15# Mason hard mono Weedquard


Red or orange marabou Tail base Tail feather Grizzly hackle

Marabou to match grizzly Tail topping Crystal flash

Flash

Crystal or cactus chenille, or Body coarse dubbing

Webby grizzly, to match body Rib Dumbbells or bead chain Eyes

INSTRUCTIONS FOR TYING

1. Attach mono for weedguard on top of hook above barb, long end facing to rear. Cover mono with thread well down bend.

2. Mount red or orange marabou for tail base. It should be short—about 1/2 shank length.

3. Select webby dyed grizzly hackle, and mount it directly on top of tail base. It should be tied on with tip extending off rear, about 2x length of shank, and with concave side down.

MARABALTALL CONTONE SIDE CONTONE SIDE

4. Now mount marabou to match grizzly hackle, directly on top of the hackle, at the same tie-in point. This marabou should be length of shank.

5. Add crystal flash strands on sides of marabou.

6. Tie on the chenille, and then the ribbing hackle (tip first). Take one wind of chenille behind the ribbing hackle, and cover shank with chenille.

7. Palmer up the ribbing hackle, being sure to have some fluff at the front when done.

8. Mount eyes about one hook eye length behind the eye; figure-8 the eyes, and then pull the weedguard up, fastening it under the hook.

9. Form nice tapered head, and superglue the entire head and eye area.



FISHMASTER'S REPORT FEBRUARY, 1994

January's first outing was a successful trip to the Stanislaus River, on Saturday, January 8th. A big "thanks" goes to Don Steffa, who took the time to chair this outing and make it a fun event.

For those of you who don't know, the river below Goodwin Dam is open to "single barbless hook", catch and release fishing after January 1st. Small nymph patterns (e.g., \$18-20 Hare's Ear or Bird's Nest) seem to work best, arranged in tandem fashion--i.e., with a dropper or similar arrangement.

Attending were Ron English, Mark Niece, Terry Eggleston, Bill Carnazzo, Jim Holmes (and son), Bill Lockhart, Frank Stolten, Don Steffa, Verne Stubbs, Bus Gehring, Tom Klinefelter, & John Peterson (and granddaughter).

The flow was a bit high, which made wading in certain spots a little tricky. Many flies were lost to overhanging brush, and debris on the bottom. Still, quite a few fish were landed.

The "most" fish category was won by Jim Holmes. The largest fish category was won by Bill Carnazzo. Don presented each winner with a set of flies tied for the Stan. Don reportedly hooked a steelie, but just couldn't manage it on his 5X or 6X tippet.

By the time you read this, we will have gone on the January 29th steelhead outing to the Feather River. We'll report on that in the March Leader. Also, don't forget the Pyramid Lake outing on February 20th. Unfortunately, that is also the weekend that the Pyramid Lake derby is being held there--but it will still be fun.

FISHING LICENSE TO BE WORN (New Law Takes Effect March 1st)

At its meeting January 4, the California Fish and Game Commission adopted a regulation that each person fishing must have his/her fishing license <u>visibly displayed above the waist beginning March 1, 1994</u>. The benefits anticipated are: (1) greater compliance with the licensing law, (2) reduced enforcement costs checking for licenses, and (3) increased revenue for sport fishing programs.

The downside of the new law is that it was enacted after the Department had distributed the 1994 fishing licenses. Therefore, for the first year, we'll need to share ideas on how to best display our licenses. The worst case scenario would be to fold your license, place it in a small Ziploc bag with the stamps showing, and fasten it to your vest, hat or other garment with a safety pin.

Unless you want to wear the license fully opened to its 3" X 6" size, and do not intend to add any stamps to it before its expiration December 31, 1994, DO NOT LAMINATE IT. The sports stores are receiving various covers from vendors for use this year, DFG has water resistent covers available for 25¢ at field offices and is looking for cost effective ways to make future licenses waterproof.

The Department of Fish & Game's CalTIP Hotline 1-800-952-5400 is now staffed full time (24 hours every day).

To ensure the line is open to receive calls reporting resource violations, DFG requests that general questions be directed to local DFG offices (found in the Government section of the telephone book) or DFG headquarters (916-653-7664). General calls should be placed during normal work hours Monday through Friday.
