FLYTYER'S CORNER

Grey Hackle/Yellow (dry)

November, 1994

This fly has sentimental value to me, in that many (too many) years ago it produced my largest ever Upper Sac rainbow. If you read the manuals, you will see many versions of this fly; the following represents an adaptation which appears to me to work consistently. Why have such a fly? One needs a yellow-bodied dry, and this is as good as any Catskill-style pattern.

Materials

Hook Tiemco 100; Mustad 94840. #14-20
Tail Grizzly (stiff) hackle points
Butt Red dubbing (rabbit is good)

Body Yellow dubbing (ditto)

Rib Silver mylar tinsel (ex. small)

Wing Dark blue dun Hackle Grizzly-sparse

Thread Yellow 8/0







FINDING THE "BEST ROD"


On Saturday, October 15th, John Hogg and his crew of instructors presented a Performance Evaluation Clinic to 10 very appreciative flycasters. As the experts passed on their combined knowledge of fly rods, lines, and leaders, we eagerly tried to absorb as much as we possibly could. We spent the morning learning the details of fly rods in a reallife, hands on way. We learned about fast rods and slow rods, how to find the spline (and what it means), what dampening is and why it is important, how the guides should be placed and much, much more. We used a detailed comparison sheet to conduct blind evaluations of the equipment. Next our President provided a very descriptive lesson on the many nuances of fly lines and leaders. We learned how important the proper line to rod match is and how to select the right line and leader for any given fishing situation.


After a gourmet lunch we each took a couple of rods down to the pond for our final exam. Have you ever been able to cast 25 or 30 different fly rod/reel combinations in the same afternoon? What an experience ! The tremendous differences in the equipment became obvious very quickly. We tested rods that ranged from \$30 to \$450. Testing was done with the labels covered so we were not influenced by brand name. We found that brand name and price alone cannot be used to determine casting quality, and that each person had his or her own set of requirements. There was no one "best rod." Next time someone in a shop hands me a "big name" rod and asks what I think of it, will be very interesting. I won't just wave it around and make some comment about how nice it feels, etc. I recommend that everyone in the Club take advantage of this clinic if we can persuade our experts to do it again. Thank you very much to all who contributed and special thanks to Ed and Marie for providing the "classroom."

Tying instructions

- 1. After jamming thread on hook, apply small ball of red dubbing immediately above rear of barb.
- 2. Cut 8-10 barbules of stiff grizzly, preferably using a spade hackle. Tie on just in front of small ball; length = shank. Wind thread back against ball, causing tail fibres to spread.
- 3. Take two dun hackles, and use tips for wings. NOTE: the technique for this has been the subject of past articles in this column. If you have trouble with it, call me. Wing should be mounted at the 1/3 shank length point back from eye.
- 4. Return thread to tail point, and dub body up behind wing. Now rib with the tinsel, making 3 turns.
- 5. Tie in stiff grizzly hackle just behind wings, and take two winds behind, and two winds in front of wings. Take care not to crowd hook eye.
- 6. Form nice small head, and whip finish.

FLYTYING CONTEST RULES


Don't be reluctant to submit your entry...ask for a critique if you want help, or to know what the winning fly has that yours doesn't. Here's the rules:

- * Each member entering a fly gets a free ticket, on which name and phone is placed
- * Tickets deposited in a sealed box each meeting
- * Drawing held at annual picnic (commencing in 1995)
- * Winner gets \$100 gift certificate at fly shop of choice.

As you know, certain of the tyers in the club have voluntarily kept themselves out of the contest; that will continue to be the case. So, enter your flies, folks...don't be shy!!!








FISHMASTER'S REPORT November, 1994 Bill Carnazzo, Fishmaster
