FALL TYING CLASSES


The Board, at its August meeting, decided to sponsor at least two flytying classes this Fall. First, a beginning tyer's class will be offered in November. Bill Carnazzo will be the instructor; if we have a large signup, we will run two classes simultaneously, with another instructor handling the second group.

Second, a seminar called "Tips, Tricks & Techniques" will be offered sometime after Jan. 1, 1995. This seminar will consist of 5 or 6 sessions, each tackling a different subject. For example, one session will be on dry fly construction, emphasizing no particular pattern, but demonstrating many techniques that experienced tyers have found helpful over the years.

If there is sufficient demand, an intermediate class may also be scheduled. This has not, however, been approved by the Board.

Each of these classes will require advance signup. Signup sheets will be available commencing at the Sept. meeting. Payment of the \$10.00 fee, non-refundable, will be required at the time of signup. Each class will be limited to 10 persons, on a first-come, first-serve basis.

The background on this fly, and its variations and uses, is set forth in Jack Dennis' book called **Tying Flies With Jack Dennis** and Friends, at page 91. Suffice it to say that it is a dynamite emerger pattern. The following is the "mahogany" version; choose other color combinations to suit.

<u>Materials</u>

Hook Tiemco 100; Mustad 94840. Sizes 10-20

Thread 8/0 brown

Tail Stiff brown hackle fibres, clipped

Abdomen Tying thread

Ribbing White 8/0 thread

Thorax Brown fine poly dubbing

Wingcase Natural deer hair Forewing Natural deer hair

Hackle Dun or dun dyed grizzly neck hackle



NEW GBF COMMITTEE - TRAINING AND EDUCATION

At the last Board of Directors meeting (August 18) a motion to create a new club committee was approved. This committee will be called the Training and Education Committee and will be chaired by John Hogg. This committee will be responsible for scheduling and organizing various seminars and clinics throughout the year. Typical classes include: fly tying, casting, equipment, and techniques. Instructions

1. Tie in tail just above back of barb. Now clip it to about 1/2 length of shank.

2. Tie in ribbing and build a slim thread body. Now wind rib forward-three turns-to a point 1/3 shank length behind eye.

3. Dub thorax; make it a bulkier than body. It should extend to a point 2 eye widths behind eye.


4. Clean and stack small bunch of hair, and attach it between eye and the front of thorax, with tips out over hook eye. Length should be equal to shank. Do not allow it to rotate—keep it on top of hook.


5. Trim butts to form small wingcase over thorax.


6. Attach hackle feather between wing case and wing, and make 2 or 3 wraps behind wing, and one in front of wing. Whip finish.

Fish this beast in the surface film. The back will hang down; the hair and hackle will float the front, and make it visible.

See ya on the creek!!!!








FLYTYING CONTEST RULES

- * Each member entering a fly gets a free ticket, on which name and phone is placed
- * Tickets deposited in a sealed box each meeting
- * Drawing held at annual picnic (commencing in 1995)
- * Winner gets \$100 gift certificate at fly shop of choice.

As you know, certain of the tyers in the club have voluntarily kept themselves out of the contest; that will continue to be the case. So, enter your flies, folks...don't be shy!!!

FISHMASTER'S REPORT September, 1994 Bill Carnazzo, Fishmaster

- 1. UPCOMING OUTINGS. Please note that the Outing Schedule, at the rear of the Leader, sets out dates for each fishout. Mark your calendars if you are going to attend. The next outing will be the Robinson Creek trip, set for the Sept. 17th weekend. It is a long daytrip, so consider camping out or taking a motel. The Davis Lake outing is cancelled—we'll do it next year.
- 2. PAST OUTINGS. On Saturday, Aug. 13th, 13 GBF members travelled to the North Fork of the Yuba, above Downieville, to fish the gearrestricted section between Ladies Canvon Creek and the westerly boundary of Sierra City. The trout were reasonably cooperative, and it was a good trip for learning to handle nymphs in pocket water. The dry fly fishing was spotty. Some nice fish were caught, with a few in the above-15" range. On Saturday, Aug. 20th, about 10 of us attended the Lake Natoma Hex hatch outing; the only hatch we saw was the twolegged homosapiens (best imitated by a Wooly Bugger). All were soundly skunked!!! We had fun, though, eating M & M's after getting out of the water.






There are a number of situations currently on going which may have major impact on future fishing and the environment. Here is a brief list of some of those of interest. Keep informed regarding these issues. If you have opinions make sure you are heard by contacting the proper source.

- 1) A petition to list all western drainage steelhead as an endangered species has been received by the National Marine Fisheries Service. A status review is currently being conducted concerning steelhead trout and the need to list some or all stocks as threatened or endangered. This review will be completed in February 1995.
- A plan to remove dead and diseased timber in the Woodfords area (near Markleeville) has been delayed due to an appeal filed by the California Wilderness Coalition, an "environmental" group based in Davis. If any of you have been to the Tahoe Basin area lately you can see by the number of dead and dying trees that the whole place is a disaster waiting to happen. All it will take is one well placed lightning strike and then its off to the races for a major fire storm.
- The Federation of Flyfishers (FFF) Executive 3) unanimously Board has approved recommendation to oppose the proposed EPA lead ban on the manufacture and sale of lead fishing weights. Even though FFF instrumental in the effort to ban lead use in National Parks and Wildlife Refuges, the FFF action was based on a lack of scientific evidence put forth by EPA to substantiate the determination of risk from lead exposure.

The September meeting program will take a look at "the ways things used to be" in Northern California fishing. Joe Shershack from Kiene's Fly Shop will be sharing some vintage films with us which highlight the good ol' days of salmon and striper fishing. This promises to be an excellent program. Those of you who are old enough to remember will nod in agreement when you see these films; younger anglers will be amazed to see what fishing used to be in this area.
