President's Message

In my work as a personal coach and consultant, I get to talk to a lot of people about current trends. The idea of simplification is getting to be a hot topic as many people search for ways to reduce the complexity in their lives.

Fly Fishing Made Simple

This concept can be readily applied to fly fishing. For example "American Angler" magazine recently ran an interesting article naming "The Thirteen Essential Trout Flies." There is no doubt this small collection could catch a lot of fish, which proves how complicated we can make fly fishing. (By the way, despite the wisdom of the authors, you won't catch me on a trout stream without a few Bird's Nests.)

I was fooling with my fly fishing stuff the other day and suddenly realized that I was in the very bowels of complexity and didn't even realize it. Fly tying materials are bulging out of every drawer and plastic container. My fly boxes are crowded with flies; many haven't been used in recent memory, if at all. My fishing vest could use a set of wheels, since it is crammed with tackle items and essential survival gear from waterproof matches to Jolly Ranchers.

Realizing the absurdity of this, I'm going to simplify things and take a little stress out of my fly fishing life. I'm going to get rid of a bunch fly tying of materials I never use, including the 35 spools of thread that have accumulated in a shoe box. My fly assortment is going to be trimmed down to those flies I have confidence in and will really use. There should be no prob-

February Fishout

East Walker River Saturday, Feb. 7

Rick Radoff, long-time GBF member and former president of the club, is hosting the February 7 fishout to the East Walker River. He describes it as a mediumsize stream, freestone, with some pocket water and riffles.

The quarry are rainbws and brown trout, caught on both nymphs and dries. Rick likes beadhead Bird's Nest and Prince Nymph, and Caddis emerger; also midges in 20's to 22's.

He recommends 8 1/2 to 9 foot rods, 4 to 6 weight, with a dry line.

Rick plans to stay overnight so participants in the fishout can fish on Sunday, as well. Accomodations and supplies are available in Bridgeport.

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Smash barb. Slip 4 or 5 beads onto hook.
- 2. Tie thread in about 1/8" behind eye, and build small thread ball there to keep front bead in place.
- 3. Cross thread over front bead and push this bead against the ball you just made. Now wind thread between first and second bead to creat separation between them. Repeat this procedure with all beads, ending up with tying thread at middle of hook bend.
- 4. Take some dubbing and spin it onto tying thread. keeping the fibers long. Begin winding the dubbing on behind last bead, moving forward through all of the beads until you reach the front of the first bead. There stop dubbing and place a few winds of thread to secure dubbing into place. Whip finish, but don't cut the thread.
- 5. Take a "teasing" tool, such as hook end velcro strip glued onto a stick, and tease out the dubbing so as to create a

"halo" effect around the beads. If the dubbing looks too long, trim

it to shape.

Using a small partridge or grouse feather, create a softhackle set of legs in front of the front bead, whip finish, and cut



thread. If done properly, and with a sparkly dubbing, the fly should look translucent and buggy. It needs to be fished at or near the bottom, as these bugs sometimes "drift" either willingly or unwillingly.

Flytier's Corner

This Month's Pattern: "Bead Rockworm"

Here is another in our series of simple patterns. I first saw this pattern tied by Jim Pettis, a Redding guide.

The "rockworm" version is just one adaptation of this method of tying. In other words, using different colored beads, different dubbing, and different hook styles and/or sizes, this same method can be used to



create a nearly infinite variety of imitations.

This particular version is designed to suggest the small free-living Caddis which are typically found in the riverbed on freestone streams.

MATERIALS

Hook Scud hook, such as Tiemco 2457,

sizes 14-18

Thread

Olive 6/0 or 8/0

Body

Small olive/pearl glass beads and me-

dium olive synthetic dubbing, with a

"sparkle" to it

Legs

Grouse or partridge,

tied as "soft hackle"

Head

Olive tying thread

As we GBF'ers huddled under the porch, Bill commented on tight loops, breaking wrists, power stops front and back, lifting the line on backcast for maximum gravitational assistance and much more. The location will be either at my pond or Bill Carnazzo's, depending on class size. Both are in Newcastle. We will announce the location after sign-ups.


For all clinics, bring your

own rod with a floating weight-forward or double taper line and a 7 to 9 foot tapered leader (2X, 1X or 0X). If, however, you don't have equipment, some extra rods and reels will be on hand for you to use.

Useful accessories to bring include line nippers and some red yarn for a simulated fly. Bring sun and eye protection and drinking water. Eye protection is a must if you will be casting — especially for youngsters!

How to get to Kiene's: Kiene's is located at the corner of Fulton and Marconi, next to Mel Rapton Honda.


